

#### The Artists

Bill Harley's original work combines song and story to paint a vibrant, humorous and meaningful portrait of American life. One of the finest performers for families in the country, he has also authored several plays and children's books. Bill is a regular contributor to public radio programs, including commentaries on NPR's All Things Considered and as host of Vermont Public Radio's Camel's Hump Radio, which focuses on children's literature. His venues include kindergarten classrooms, teacher conferences and concert stages with symphony orchestras. Twice nominated for a Grammy Award, his twenty-five recordings for children, families and adults have garnered numerous national awards.

Carol Titus has been delighting audiences for 15 years. She co-founded the NJ Storytelling Network and facilitates the NJ Storytelling Festival. As 'Tattle Tales', she has told zillions of stories to young people. For adult audiences, she specializes in 'True stories that never happened.'

Julie Pasqual is a self proclaimed "creativity junky" whose first art form was dance. Other skills she uses in her storytelling include clowning, American Sign Language, and occasionally, stilt-walking. She tells a mixture of folktales, fairytales, and original stories for young and old, and has been heard in such ventures as the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the New Jersey Storytelling Festival, and in schools, libraries, bookstores, hospitals, private events, and radio.

Pat Kane has spent a lifetime telling stories, from neighborhood gatherings in the back yard as a child, through a classroom career as a teacher, and as an environmental educator with the New Jersey Audubon Society. She specializes in nature legends, folk tales, and fairy tales. Audience participation through song and dramatization is woven into programs for small children

Ken Galipeau, a storyteller for over 13 years, is a collector of stories, songs and poems that touch our hearts and funny bone. He has performed in schools, libraries, church, storytelling festival, parties, etc. He has been the featured storyteller at numerous Tellabrations in NJ including Crosswicks, Jersey Shore and Morristown. He has presented a storytelling program at the NJ Storytelling Festival for the last 11 years. Ken is also a favorite festival, coffeehouse and concert performer who performs for people of all ages and accompanies himself on guitar, drum, and piano and sings a cappella.
